Getting to Know Your School Board

I ran for the Board of Education with the hope that I could have a positive impact on the community which has been so generous and gracious to my entire family.

Although we did not move here until June 2004 (exactly one week before the tornado,) we became “Mulvaniacs” in 2003 when my husband, Phil, began teaching and coaching at the high school. At the same time, our son, Sam, enrolled at MMS as a seventh grader. In part because of our involvement in athletics, we quickly felt at home in Mulvane. By the following school year we were living here, and our daughter, Maggie, was enrolled as a fourth grader at MGS; she is currently a junior at the high school.

As much as we loved Mulvane during the good times, we discovered that the community’s true colors shine during times of tragedy. In January of 2006 I was diagnosed with breast cancer, resulting in four surgeries and eight rounds of chemotherapy. What an outpouring of love we received! In November of that same year Sam, and his best friend, Kyle Adams were killed in a car wreck. There is no doubt in my mind that the love and support we got from our friends - those we knew and those we did not - allowed us to survive that terrible time. There is not enough space in this newsletter, nor are there adequate words, to describe the amazing acts of kindness we witness, even to this day!



My mission, as a board member, a parent, a teacher, and a community member is to promote character and civility. We emphasize it through the Spirit of Three Memorial Scholarship, created in honor of Sam, Kyle, and Emmy Sue, and I try to model it in my daily actions. I hope that someday everyone will live by the credo I learned from my parents: Doing the right thing isn’t always easy, but it is always right.

Spring Kansas Computerized Assessments February 15 - April 20, 2012

The state of Kansas requires students take a battery of Kansas Assessments in the spring of each school year. **No Child Left Behind** (NCLB) requires each state assess the following subjects:

Reading and Math in the 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades and once in high school.

Science in 4th, and 7th grades. Life Science in 9th grade. Physical Science in 11th grade.

History/Government assessment is required on alternating years for 6th, 8th, 10th, and 12th grade students. **Students will be assessed this year.**

Writing is assessed every other year and is **scheduled to be assessed in 2012-2013** for 5th, 8th, and 11th grades.

Specific testing schedules will be available at your student's buildings.

Consider the following to help your student prepare for testing:

- Regular school attendance
- Proper rest/exercise/diet
- Quiet/comfortable place for studying at home
- Space out study time over day and weeks
- Schedule appointments around test days
- Encourage students

Students at the Mulvane Grade School have been running the soles off their shoes in Physical Education.

They started by jogging/biking to the park to play Frisbee Golf...continued with timed runs and lots of games like Capture the Flag. They learned how to take their pulse and how to judge whether they were working hard enough to condition a strong heart. They learned how long, how hard and how often you need to work out to condition for Cardiovascular Fitness and what types of activities were best to accomplish that goal. Students participated in our annual school wide Capture the Turkey event the Tuesday before break. It started in the morning with grade level competitions in the grassy area east of the building until one class emerged the winner from each grade level. Fifteen minutes later, Mrs. Morris's class admitted defeat to Mrs. Cottrell's class. The teachers assembled around 2:15 for the competition against Mrs. Cottrell's fifth grade. KSN news was in attendance to film the battle. After a hard fight, the teachers once again emerged the winner in an 8 to 6 victory over Mrs. Cottrell's class. It was all smiles and high fives as the teachers and students congratulated each other on a fun and hard fought game.



Big In Schools Program

The Bigs In Schools Program, a spin-off of the successful mentoring program Big Brothers Big Sisters, is now being offered to students in Mulvane Schools. *More volunteers are needed* to make it a success. Any community member who enjoys working with children of any age and can give just one hour of their week is eligible! Interested individuals will go through a screening process and are monitored through the match. Mentors/ "Bigs" then meet with their "Little" once a week during the school day. Bigs can help with schoolwork, play games, or eat lunch together. Volunteers are asked to make at least a one year commitment to the program.

The benefits to children who participate in Big Brothers Big Sisters or Bigs in schools are evident, according to a study conducted by Harris Interactive. Alumni of the program are 75% more likely than non-alumni to earn a four-year college degree and tend to earn more money in their jobs as adults. Eighty-nine percent of students who participate reported improved grades and 71% reported improved student attitude.


MSGT John Dingman Visits the Classroom

MMS School-wide Fundraiser

The winter season is upon us, and with it comes the possibility of inclement weather affecting school opening. We understand that our decision to open or close schools in bad weather has a big impact on families. The safety and security of our students and staff is our highest priority.

The decision to close schools is based on the best information available at the time the decision is made. Although the staff and superintendent do their best in the process, we know that often no perfect decision exists. **IF WE ARE OPEN AND YOU DO NOT FEEL THAT IT IS SAFE FOR YOUR CHILD TO ATTEND SCHOOL, THEN PLEASE DO NOT SEND YOUR CHILD.** Please note the reason for absence is the inclement weather. You can always wait until the bad weather passes and then bring your child to school for the remainder of the day.

How do we make school closing decisions?

The decision to open or close schools in bad weather is based on a careful analysis of all the relevant factors, including:

- Road conditions throughout the school district
- Amount of snow and ice
- Whether precipitation is expected to continue
- Building conditions
- Parking lot and sidewalk conditions at the schools
- Temperatures and wind chill factors
- Collaboration with surrounding school Superintendents

Who makes the decision?

- The Superintendent of School is responsible for the final decision, based on the above factors and input from the transportation and facilities departments, and collaboration with surrounding school Superintendents.

When is the decision made?

- The decision is typically made between 5:00 - 5:30 AM

How is the public notified?

- You will be notified by a direct phone call from USD 263, using the *School Messenger* calling system.
- The notice is also posted on the local TV stations (Ch. 3, 10, 12) along with local radio stations- KFDI, KICT, KYQQ, KKRK, KRBB, KEYN, KFBZ, KFH

What Can You DO?

Be prepared! When weather is threatening the night before, please have plans for the possibility that school may be closed.
