

Note from the School Nurse

Cold/Flu Season is upon us!

Fall is here and with the beautiful changing of the leaves we also have cold/flu season fast approaching. Now is a great time, as *ALWAYS*, to remember to practice good hand hygiene.

Students, teachers and all adults alike should wash their hands with soap and water after using the restrooms, coughing, sneezing, or blowing their noses. We can prevent a lot by washing our hands frequently with soap and water and covering our coughs and sneezes. Please help to remind your children how to properly cover their coughs and sneezes, and how to wash their hands.

Washing Hands:

- Wet hands under running water.
- Apply soap and scrub tops, bottoms, between fingers and sides for 20-30 seconds away from the water.
- Rinse off soap with running water and dry hands.

Covering the Cough:

- Cough or sneeze into your elbow or a tissue and make sure to cover your mouth and nose.
- Always wash your hands after using a tissue. Use hand sanitizer only if soap and water are not available.

Just a reminder that we can't prevent everyone from getting sick, but we can reduce the chances by practicing these steps above. Getting the flu vaccine is also a great way to reduce your risk.

Dear Parents,

Below is some helpful information regarding Head lice. Head lice should be suspect when there is intense itching and scratching of the scalp and back of neck. Any child with lice will be sent home and must be rechecked by the school nurse before returning to school or before they can ride the bus.

Head lice are spread most commonly by direct contact with the hair of an infested person. Spread by contact with inanimate objects and personal belongings may occur but is very uncommon as head lice cannot live off of a human host for longer than 1-2 days.

Can head lice be spread by sharing objects such as sports helmets or headphone? Head lice feet are specially adapted for holding onto human hair. Head lice would have difficulty attaching firmly to smooth or slippery surfaces like plastic, metal, polished synthetic leathers, and other similar materials.

Head lice are small, about the size of a sesame seed. They move fast and shy away from light, so are hard to find in the hair. They cannot fly or jump. Diagnosis of head lice is usually made from the presence of their eggs, called nits. The nits are firmly attached to the hair shaft about 1/4 of an inch away from the scalp. They are whitish and tear-dropped shaped. Nits may be more plentiful behind the ears or at the nape of the neck. Although these eggs may look like dandruff, dandruff can easily be removed from the hair, while nits are not easily removed even by pulling. If the presence of nits are found, **the school nurse will call the parent and all the following steps need to be taken.**

The following steps need to be taken when head lice or nits are present:

- 1. Don't panic anyone can get head lice. It has nothing to do with cleanliness, nor does it reflect on you as a parent.
- 2. Use an approved shampoo for lice as directed in instructions. There are several brands available, including prescription shampoos.
- 3. Remove all nits. The nits will not wash out. A fine toothed comb, good light and patience are needed. A cream rinse or vinegar rinse may help loosen the nits. It is usually necessary to pull nits from the hair shaft with your fingernails. Nits that are not removed and are not dead will hatch in 7-10 days after the first treatment. Therefore, a second treatment with shampoo is necessary a week later.
- 4. All clothing, towels, and bedding used during the time of infestation should be washed thoroughly in soap and hot water each time they are used. Items that cannot be safely washed, such as stuffed animals, should be put in a plastic bag for a minimum of two weeks. Insecticide spray may be used on carpets or cloth covered furniture.
- 5. Vacuum carpets, car seats, and furniture frequently daily if possible.

Please do not hesitate to call with any questions and speak to the nurse. Thank you for helping us help your child!

This month we will focus our efforts on Bully Prevention activities. This is consistent with National Bullying Prevention Month. This is an issue we focus on throughout the year. You should know our district has a strong bullying prevention policy and constantly works with students on preventing bullying behavior every month throughout the school year.

We spend a great deal of time with teachers on developing positive behaviors and instilling positive character in our students. We teach bullying prevention through the Lions Quest curriculum approved by the Board of Education. We would encourage you to visit with your child's principal and learn more about the activities that will be provided this week and throughout the year.

As was mentioned earlier, what makes Mulvane a great community and school district is our students and patrons. That support should carryover outside of the school day. We all have the responsibility of teaching our children that bullying behaviors are hurtful. They can be hurtful regardless of whether they are made in person, electronically, or on social media.

This October we ask that you help us by discussing bullying behaviors with your child. Have them practice or demonstrate behaviors that Promote Responsibility, Act with Respect, Work Together and Stop Bullying Behaviors. Let them know that bullying behavior will not be tolerated during or outside of the school day. Most importantly, as adult role models we must demonstrate positive behaviors for our children each and every day. Peers and family have a huge impact on our children during the time they are away from school.
