Project SEARCH is up and running at the Mulvane Hampton Inn. Project SEARCH is a national program that trains students in job skills. A grant was obtained by the Mulvane School District from the Kansas Council on Developmental Disabilities to start the program this school year.

Area students participate in a full day of job training under the supervision of Connie Sneeringer, instructor, at the Mulvane High School, and Mary Caudell who works as a job coach to assist students in their job internships. Students work in housekeeping, laundry and maintenance. It is hoped that the interns will branch out to other internship sites at the hotel as the year progresses.

School Safety Planning, Preparation, Partnership

The safety of our students and staff is always our number one priority. We regularly update our safety/ security plans and have them reviewed by local law enforcement and safety experts. School staff are trained and prepared in all types of emergency situations.

Recently district administrators, staff, the Kansas Highway Patrol, Mulvane Police/Fire/EMS and regional law enforcement agencies teamed up to practice table top exercises for multiple emergency situations. It is our hope that this training will never be necessary but one that is needed for the safety of all students and staff.

The workshop provided district administrators and law enforcement partners a shared understanding of how to respond in extreme emergencies. Furthermore, by coming together we all have a greater understanding of how important of a role each agency plays in reviewing safety procedures and protecting students and staff.

Fathers, step -fathers, grandfathers, or other father-figures are involved in their student's school or classroom and gain a greater awareness of the positive impact they have in the school. 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MGS Sports and Fitness Skills

As the weather turns cooler, so the activities in PE are turning into "winter mode." We are getting down to the business of working on the skills we evaluated in the first six weeks of school. In the third grade we looked at basic skills of locomotion, throwing and catching. As we move deeper into fall and march towards winter, we will be doing centers and playing games that focus on improving these basic skills.

In the fourth grade, we looked at throwing and catching, added a sit-ups test for abdominal strength, a non-dominant bank shot test to address bi -laterality and an underhand volleyball serve test. Centers and games will include tasks that address these areas as well as many other sports and fitness skills.

In the fifth grade we tested abdominal strength with a one minute sit-ups test, upper body strength with a one minute push-ups test, hamstring flexibility with a sit and reach test, bi-laterality with both a left and right 30 second bank shot test and an overhead serving test. Centers and games this winter will focus on improvement from individual baselines established with those tests as well as other sports and fitness skills.

Students in all grade levels have been participating in a Flag Football unit since we completed the baseline evaluations. As we begin our Cardiovascular Unit, working our way to our annual "Capture the Turkey" event in November, games we played during the Football unit will re-emerge as fun Aerobic games and a way to build our Cardiovascular endurance for our 15 minute walk/jog event at the end of the unit.



Students in Mrs. McElroy's 8th grade Introduction to Spanish class have completed two projects this semester that made them 'experts' on a particular Central or South American country. Students first researched the country, then completed and presented a poster to the rest of the class. Next, students researched information about arts and crafts or other information about the pre-Columbian era of that country. The students then created an artifact, shared it with the group along with information about why they chose that item, and now those artifacts are on display in the 'museum' in the display case outside the big gym. Stop by and see their work!

MMS Spanish

In addition to researching countries, students have also learned simple greetings, numbers to 100, days of the week, months of the year, and the Spanish alphabet. They celebrated Mexican independence Day in September and look forward to learning about The Day of the Dead and how it's celebrated at the end of October.

Re: New Math Standards

We believe all children have a right to an education that prepares them to be successful in a competitive global economy. In order to compete in a knowledge -based global economy we must improve the academic performance of our students. Our teachers share these same expectations for education and encourage family support in this move forward with the adoption of Kansas College and Career Readiness Standards (KCCRS).

KCCRS has produced K-12 standards in the foundational subjects of math and English that meet the expectation of preparing students for success after high school graduation. KCCRS set consistent, focused, rigorous academic expectations for all students. Forty-six other states have adopted similar standards with the same vision in mind. We support these more rigorous academic standards that are currently being rolled out in classrooms across the country. As parents, you may have noticed a shift in the presentation of math concepts in our new math materials currently being implemented in your student's class. The KCCRS emphasizes the development of a deeper conceptual understanding that requires students to transfer mathematical skills across concepts. To achieve such an understanding, students must be provided with opportunities to think more critically about a problem and be able to both talk and write about it. There have been some challenges; however, we are very excited to see our students thinking more critically and at higher levels. The KCCRS will help pave the way for mathematical skill development at a level that will serve students throughout their lives.

Healthy School Meals

Under the National School Lunch Program, school lunches must include a choice of milk, fruits and vegetables, grains and proteins. These meals are required to meet federal nutrition standards limiting fat and portion size.

In Mulvane, we are meeting all these requirements and going the extra mile to make school meals healthy and inviting for our students. We offer a full salad bar daily at each building that is included with every school meal. Some of the items on the salad bars are broccoli, cucumbers, carrots, bell peppers, salad mix, fresh fruits and low calorie dressings. We're even making kid favorites more nutritious.

Sodium levels have been reduced this year under the new HHFKA standards and all grains are at least 51% whole grain in all items. We are trying to find new ways to make the food healthier and to find other items for students to try that may someday become a favorite.

We encourage parents to join their student for lunch or breakfast. If you would like to do so, please call the school to let them know and they will inform the cooks so they can plan for more guest.
